#### Discussion:

- Members highlighted the need for family friendly events and school holiday programs.
- It was noted that the traffic at Anglers Tavern is impacting road safety.
- Mentoring project could involve a guest speaker at a community event, for example Jemima Richards, bushfire survivor from King Lake and guest speaker at the Community Strengths and Opportunities Workshop.
- Members engaged with their networks and agreed that if equine assisted therapy goes ahead, it should not involve the VRC. Views differed on whether this should be a priority item, however members agreed to categorise this as orange. If this project goes ahead, it could involve bus trips to alternative locations as opposed to utilising VRC facilities.
- Members noted that so many households in Maribyrnong have their own gardens to tend to, therefore a community garden may not be well-utilised. Members suggested gardening events, programs and activities that provide benefit for residents' own gardens.
- Members stated that the new Maribyrnong Neighbourhood Flood Network cannot rely on the former system involving flood wardens. It was noted that the aim of the network is to maximise the reach of the existing warning system and improve community awareness of flood risk by utilising existing community networks, as opposed to appointing wardens.
- Members discussed the suggestion for establishing a walking group, which was popular on social media. Members agreed to select a time and create a WhatsApp group to establish the walking group. From there, community members can decide how often they meet. The walking group should be promoted on Facebook, the Community Recovery Newsletter and Council website.

## **Community Resilience Projects**

The Flood Recovery Manager advised that GIVIT have funding available for community resilience projects. Members discussed the following projects:

- Wellbeing initiatives such as support circles with mental health practitioners, healing spaces and art therapy
- Infrastructure to create community gathering places, e.g. dog park fence
- Report into the economic impacts of the flood to be used for advocacy purposes
- Historical storytelling projects, including the creation of a Maribyrnong Historical Society

Action: Council to confirm if community resilience projects meet the criteria for the GIVIT funding

## Next steps

• Project-specific meetings will continue on an as-needed basis and will include invitations to community workshop attendees who expressed interest in being involved.

## Maribyrnong Insurance Project

Shweta Kawatra Dakin presented an update on the Maribyrnong Insurance Project:

- 6 GenWest have completed 17 community conversations, with the initial 14 community conversations transcribed to date and included in this summary. This included:
  - 94% home-owners directly affected by the 2022 flood and 6% renters
  - 76% who identify as female



- 24% who identify as male
- 18% who are between 60-80yrs of age
- 41% who identify as Vietnamese
- 30% who identify as having another migrant background
- 29% who identify as Anglo-Saxon Australian

All initial 14 community members mentioned they appreciated the opportunity to share their story and feel heard. Three of the community members they held conversations with are still experiencing hardship and require support. GenWest have supported them to connect to relevant services.

In response to the Community Conversations held in the needs assessment phase, the delivery of the following items is proposed as part of the program:

- FAQ webpage available in English and Vietnamese
- Physical booklet with FAQ questions and answers, coupled with community experiences, available in English and Vietnamese
- Short videos of explaining the FAQ webpage in spoken English and spoken Vietnamese
- Resource launch event, including Q&A opportunity for community members with insurance experts

### Discussion:

- Members noted that the resource being developed should explore how intersectionality and intersecting identity may pose a challenge navigating the insurance system, e.g. First Nations people, ageing population, and other disadvantaged groups.
- Shweta noted GenWest are engaging with mental health experts as well as insurance experts in the delivery of this program.

#### Feedback/ideas

The Chair opened the floor for discussion on projects, feedback and general business:

 Andrew Montiero highlighted how during the flood clean-up, there was no awareness of standards to measure the quality of hygienist reports and cleaning services. He noted there was discrepancies in quotes received across the community and no awareness of how to measure standards.

• Members suggested a Facebook post to encourage community to shout-out a good hygienist to encourage transparency

Action: Mike Caridi to share a Facebook post to encourage members to should-out their good experiences with hygienists post-flood.

## Social Recovery Sub-Committee update

The Flood Recovery Manager provided an update from the Social Recovery Sub-Committee Meeting on 13 November 2024. Update:

- Cohealth have 48 active clients in Maribyrnong.
- Disaster Legal Help Victoria are holding a Webinar on 21 November for recovery service providers to assist community navigating building disputes. There will be speakers from Justice Connect as well as tips and tricks for engaging with builders, how to escalate disputes, concerns about quality and more.
- Disaster Legal Help Victoria are engaging with Consumer Action Law Centre, GenWest and Council about the development of an insurance resource as part of the Maribyrnong Insurance Project.
- GIVIT currently have 19 active requests for donations in Maribyrnong.
